We are delighted to bring you the Autumn issue of news update. Besides some interesting and informative reports on ministries supported by grants from TES, this issue contains extracts from the Annual Report and Accounts for the past year.

New Ship same Good News

For several years now **TES** has made grants to Christian Youth Enterprises Sailing Centre (CYESC) in West Sussex towards their schools ministry in the area. Earlier this year we made a one-off grant towards their development fund which is being used to renovate a new ship for their work.

CYESC administrator, Duncan Webb told us recently *'the work programme has been brought forward due to keen prices and God's financial provision. The*



ship was lifted out of the water on Tuesday 1st September and is being water blasted this week in preparation for hull painting next week once the ship has been moved inside a shed. We then plan to



continue to have the superstructure built, including the fitting of doors and windows, between now and Christmas'. There are new pictures and video of the process on the CYESC blog: www.cye.org.uk/barge.htm.

During this year Matt Winfield, the CYESC Schools Worker has had the opportunity to work in at least 21 schools, and many of these will take groups to the

ship for residential weeks of activities and teaching.

In February Matt led a two week mission in Glebelands School which is about an hour away from the centre. He took RE lessons for years 7, 8 & 9

on the curriculum subjects of the Bible, Jesus' life and ministry, and Love. In order not to simply appear, do the lessons and move on,

Matt worked closely with the local church's youth worker who has regular contact with the school by running a CU and after-school clubs. The head teacher was so impressed with what was done and said that Matt was invited back to lead a whole school assembly at Easter.

With primary schools in the area having to provide outdoor and adventurous activities as part of the curriculum CYESC have had the opportunity to provide this and to combine it with opportunities for the Gospel. Most of the schools involved have also visited the centre, giving the team even more time to share Jesus with the young people.

Former TES Team Evangelist, Alex Bowler, is making a series of short films that challenge people about aspects of everyday life and the choices that we have to make about the present and eternity. TES has been pleased to assist with a grant towards this innovative evangelistic project and invite you to pray that many who see the films will be challenged with the Gospel.

Journey into Eternity

On a rare fine day in July Alex, who leads the Alex Bowler Evangelistic Association (ABEA), and his friend, professional film maker Will Jukes of *Invision*, travelled to Lynton and Lynmouth in beautiful North Devon to shoot their second evangelistic gospel film, entitled 'Journey into Eternity'. On the way they filmed at Blue Anchor and Minehead (Somerset) before

ascending the notorious Porlock Hill en-route to Lynton and Lynmouth. Making the most of the glorious coastal scenery, they shot footage near Lynmouth beach; on the amazing cliff railway, and even in a cliff top cemetery!

The theme is all about making, and preparing for journeys – the most important journey being the one people make after death, either to heaven or to hell! The film clearly explains how people

can get off the broad road which leads to destruction and onto the narrow road which leads to life! Alex says, “*I was so thrilled to have the opportunity to present the wonderful good news of our Lord Jesus Christ in this new film, the second episode of '316 With Alex Bowler'. In conjunction with David Green, of*



British Christian Media, we hope to show the film on the internet and on Christian satellite TV. Jesus not Suicide is the Answer

In December 2007, former TES Associate evangelist Jeremy Bishopp published a website to reach out to those considering suicide. He had been appalled to discover that there are sites encouraging suicide, and giving ways to do it, and so decided to show people that instead of death, they can find life and peace through Jesus Christ.

During the first year the site had less than 300 page views, but Jeremy discovered that he

could advertise it through a system called Google Adwords, and would only have to pay a small amount each time someone clicked onto the site through the advert. He could also set a monthly budget to ensure he had control over the total cost. He began advertising in mid December 2008, and it

brought immediate results, so much so that by the end of that month there had been nearly 900 page views. The potential was obviously huge, but with limited finances available he knew it wouldn't be easy to sustain the advertising in the long term, and so he contacted

TES to see if it would be possible for them to give a grant to fund the advert. He was delighted when they agreed to provide the money for him to meet the monthly budget for a year.

The number of page views each month continues to rise, and in the 8 months since the advert started, they have now reached a staggering 20,000! People are able to contact Jeremy by E-mail, and each letter receives a very carefully considered

reply. Examples of what they write are, "*I am in a dark place*", "*I have come across your website feeling as low as I can get*", "*I have been a gambler for so long*", "*I feel like suicide because I have debts up to my eyeballs*". There have also been letters of thanks for the message of the site, and people have prayed the prayer of commitment because of it. At present the site is in the process of being developed further, in the hope of reaching and helping more people.

The need in this country alone is enormous, and your prayers for wisdom for Jeremy in running this ministry, that many more people would find this site, and most importantly that they will find Jesus through it, will be greatly valued. You can see the site at **www.suicide-is-not-painless.info**

Land's End and beyond



Phil Misselbrook is a Cornwall based evangelist who regularly takes the Gospel to where the people are – at fairs, fetes, parades, prayer events, town centres, village greens and RNAS airdays, to name but a few. TES is delighted to be able to help support Phil's low-key, yet cutting edge ministry to the people of Cornwall. Here are some snippets from his report of the last few months. He says:

'March 21st the best days outreach so far this year – a good team, good weather and some very good contacts with one guy in his mid

twenties trusting the Lord for the first time. The Good Friday Walk of Witness with the Falmouth churches went very well. The weather was kind so we had about 280 people from different churches turning out. Together we sang "When I survey the Wondrous Cross" on the town piazza and the Spirit of Jesus touched many folks as we walked by. The Truro Churches Together Prayer Tent in April was a hard day to begin with; the weather and people were cold. But by late

morning things began to change with many very good conversations plus folks asking for prayer. One lady simply thanked us for being there, which encouraged us. I had really good chats with two different couples, one from Scotland and the other from North Devon, and one young guy in his late teens. They were all concerned about what happens after death. I certainly helped them see that with Christ by your side you have nothing to fear. The Holy Spirit really helped me find just the right words for them and I know that the Lord will continue to work on them. For Camborne Trevithick Day the weather was awful and people were not inclined to stop but non-the-less a couple in their early twenties trusted the Lord plus another lady re-dedicated her life to Christ'.

Many people will have heard of the Padstow Obby Oss Day held on 1st May. Phil told us that it was an amazing time,

with three people accepting the Lord, over a dozen coming into the tent for prayer, several prayer request cards being filled out and many divine opportunities. He says 'I knew people were praying as we in my team of ten had such freedom to speak'.

At the St Ives Harbour Day he had a team of 5 working with some folks from St Ives Bible

Christian Chapel. Over the day the team saw three people trust the Lord, a couple on holiday from Bristol and one man from Illogan. During the Helston Flora Day two guys came to faith. They were both stallholders who had a pitch next to the prayer station table.

Besides 'doing evangelism' Phil helps others to share their



faith. In May he led a practical evangelism course at Degibna Chapel. The name 'Degibna' derives from one of the many

Celtic saints who came to Cornwall. He was a missionary monk who died in AD706 after establishing monasteries in the Celtic lands of Wales, Brittany and Cornwall.

On June 1st Phil went to the Isles of Silly at the invitation

of the Methodist Evangelism Team to encourage the church on the Islands. He says '*I had several good conversations; one with a retired couple, who I spoke to twice about the Lord, and also an Indian couple who were on holiday*'.

Prayer Tents in various towns are a regular part of Phil's

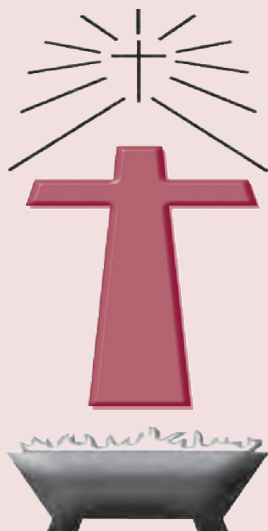
ministry. On 6th June in Falmouth it was again wet

Adapted extracts from the TRUSTEES ANNUAL REPORT For the year to 31st March 2009

CHARITABLE OBJECTS

Throughout another year the Society has been able to function effectively under the long-established object of the Society, as stated in the Constitution. This remains *'the advancement of the Christian faith primarily by providing experienced evangelists to proclaim the Gospel of the Grace of God and secondarily by the holding of Bible Conferences, Bible Schools, House Parties, Retreats and other related means'*. Grants are made to help advance the Christian faith by supporting evangelists and evangelistic projects. These sometimes include such things as house parties or camps for young people and other new forms of evangelism that come under the phrase *other related means*.

TRUSTEES

During the year the Governing Committee functioned extremely effectively with three meetings held in central London in July and December 2008 and March 2009. The Annual Members meeting was notified to all members and held following the Committee meeting in December. There are around 30 Members who are all entitled to attend. However, with the meeting principally being a formality in order to conform to the Society's Constitution, only

those present at the preceding GC meeting were actually in attendance. There was one resignation from the Committee, that of Raymond James, and no new members. For your prayers two possible candidates are being considered and, if they join, we will bring you information in a future issue of *news update*.

REVIEW of ACTIVITIES

Administration and Management – Throughout the year the day-to-day administration and management of the Society was handled by the Trust Manager, Peter Day, working on a part-time, self-employed basis from his home office for an average of 2 days per week. Where necessary between Committee meetings he liaised with the Chairman, Treasurer and other Committee members about certain matters and in following up grant applications.

The Trust Manager's responsibilities remained unchanged throughout the year. These include the receipt and processing of gifts, maintaining financial records, providing management information for the Governing Committee and acting as the Committee's secretary and Company Secretary of the Incorporated Trust.

Additionally producing and circulating the Agendas, Minutes and relevant papers for the meetings and dealing with all correspondence, e-mails, telephone calls and grant applications that the Society receives and the production of *news update*. The latter being quite time-consuming but important and effective as the Society's main means of communication with you, our prayer partners and supporters.

Publicity and Promotion

The *tes news update* was mailed in May and September, the latter being the largest issue yet with 12 A4 pages. They were mailed to over 950 supporters, prayer partners and grant recipients. (We do hope that you like the new A5 format). The TES website is receiving an increasing number of visits, not least by some potential grant applicants. It now lists the dates of GC meetings and the deadlines for grant applications. Others visit to obtain general information about the Society and, although it clearly states that we can only support evangelism in the UK, requests for support are still frequently received from Africa and India.

Grants – During the year 28 grants were made to 27 applicants totalling over

£74,000 – a slight monetary increase on the previous year, but to slightly fewer recipients. The Society continues to support the *Fellowship of Evangelists* enabling itinerant evangelists to meet together twice-yearly for mutual encouragement and teaching. A steady flow of grant applications has continued without the need for the Trust Manager to be pro-active in seeking projects to support. However, discussing details

with potential applicants and reading the applications and supporting papers, takes up a sizable proportion of his available time.

The Fellowship of Evangelists has again been overseen by a small steering group comprising Ron Spillards, Alex Bowler and William Gaydon, who plan and organise their one-day conferences. This Fellowship continues to be an encouragement to its members, who number just

under 50.

The Future – The Trust Manager is not aware of any specific legacies that can be expected during the coming year, but that is often the nature of this type of giving. However, the Society's finances remain in a healthy condition, and the Trustees look forward to continuing to assist the Lord's work through grants – *supporting evangelism in the UK* during the current year.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

For the year to 31st March 2009

GENERAL COMMENTS

As you may recall the year to 31st March 2008 was our most successful yet in terms of income since the changes that took place in 2004. However, during the past year fewer legacies were received meaning that General Income was only £43,000 compared with £154,000 in 2007/8. Total Expenditure was over £87,000, of which £71,550 was in grants. Administration costs were slightly up on the previous year, but higher as a percentage of income due to the lower level of receipts. At 31st March 2009 the Society had funds in hand totalling in excess of £120,000 which, allowing for agreed reserves, a further Dawson Trust payment and general administration for the current year, means around £77,000 is available for grants. As much as possible of

the current funds are invested in CAF Bank Accounts, which pay acceptable rates of interest, even in the current economic climate, whilst allowing prompt accessibility when funds are required. However, like most charities we are aware that funding may be restricted during this year as the recession has a negative effect on many peoples' incomes and investments.

As income for the year was lower the accounts were prepared on the receipts and payments basis, which in turn brought a saving to the Society.

GRANTS – were made to the following individuals and organisations. Some were for specific 'one-off' projects, whilst others were to assist them to maintain their valuable on-going outreach work, mainly in

local communities. We would encourage you to continue to pray for their work and ministry. Reports of some of them can be found elsewhere in this issue. ► MJK (Make Jesus Known). One grant was subsequently returned as the planned project failed to materialise.

A total in excess of £176,000 has now been giving in grants since 2005. An average of £35,200 per yr.

CONNECTED COMPANY:

The Evangelization Society Incorporated Trust (Company Reg. No. 106551) was established to act as the custodian of the Charity’s properties and leases. Although there are unlikely to be any such properties or leases in the foreseeable future, if ever, the Company is currently being maintained because it is the Trustee of the Dawson House Trust.

Dawson House Trust – In line with the Charity Commission Order a further sum has been transferred into the permanent endowment of the charity known as *The*

Evangelization Society Dawson Trust Account, which currently stands at £13,882.49. We are pleased to report that, now the appropriate section of the new Charities Bill has been implemented, steps have been taken to get a further Order from the Charity Commission allowing this fund to be use for the general purposes of the Society – namely evangelism in the UK. Our aim is to achieve this by the end of this financial year.

Copies of the full Annual Report and Accounts are available from the Trust Manager. A contribution to cover costs would be appreciated.

Stop Press: As we were going to print we received a letter from the Charity Commission informing us that they have agreed to our request to be discharged from the order relating to the Dawson Trust. Please join with us in giving thanks to God for this positive reply.

The ‘One Eighty’ Project

The ‘One Eighty Project’ is one part of Bath YFC’s outreach and training activities for young people.

They have recently increased their detached youthwork sessions and now have workers meeting young people in the skate park and on the streets three times a week. Through this many young people have heard about the work of *One Eighty* and have come to the sessions and heard the Gospel. They have also built



relationships with the park staff and worked with them

and the local skate community to redevelop local skate facilities.

THRIVE – is Bath YFC’s six week schools enrichment course, designed to help young people learn valuable life skills through skateboarding. They have continued to deliver the course across Bath schools, and recently ran a course ►

▶ in a school in Trowbridge. Through this they saw a young girl who is a full time carer have the opportunity to get out of her house and have fun, as well as increasing her confidence through learning to skateboard. Also the opportunity to talk about their faith and the work of *One Eighty*.

WEEKLY SESSIONS – are the busiest times of the week, with 25 – 30 unchurched young people every week. Young people have continued to enjoy the ramps, as well as listen to ‘think slots’, engaging in discussions on a variety of topics

from the ten commandments and other religions to how skateboarding shows who God is. The leaders say, *‘we have continued to have incredible conversations and seen young people go on to take our “Switch course”’*.



SWITCH – is an introduction to Christianity course for skaters run for the second time this year with incredible results. Ten young

people took the course, with three using it to achieve part of their Duke of Edinburgh Award. The young people were taken on a residential weekend, and many made first-time commitments, three of them going on to join the Junior Leadership Scheme. Two of the current Junior Leaders gave their testimonies

during a meeting, which was very powerful and moving. The course has also been designed and published online for other organisations to use, and has been bought to be used by organisations in South Africa and the UK, with further interest from Sweden and Portugal!

GRAFF – is a project for young people who have been involved in illegal graffiti. There are many new members and an increase in the project manager’s hours has been necessary. A particular highlight was taking part in a National Christian Arts Week, where two lads were given the opportunity to spray paint a car outside Bath Abbey!

JUNIOR LEADERSHIP SCHEME – has been developed out of a group called ‘Click’ which was designed to disciple young people who had made commitments or taken the Switch

course. JLS met the need for young people who wanted to get involved in helping out with the project and do things like achieve their Duke of Edinburgh Award. There are currently five Junior Leaders who meet together every week to pray for each other, study the bible and help set up the ramps before the evening session. The leader says *‘to see them take responsibility for the project and grow in their faith has been amazing’!*

BCM Youth Camp 2009

In early August a team of 10 leaders took 35 young people from various parts of Birmingham away to Pensarn, near Harlech, Snowdonia for the annual Birmingham City Mission (BCM) Youth Camp. They stayed at the Christian Mountain Centre (CMC) in full-board dormitory accommodation. The aim of the camp was to provide the young people with a fun and educational holiday and to

share with them the life-changing, hope-giving message of Jesus. John Platt (BCM Youthwork Co-Ordinator) told us *'this was fulfilled through a combination of centre-led outdoor activities and teaching sessions where campers explored key issues of life relating to the good news of Jesus'*.

The CMC was an ideal venue for the camp. Set in the



beautiful location of West Snowdonia, with views over the surrounding hills and flanked by the waters of Pensarn Harbour. It had excellent quality activities led by fully qualified instructors which



were enjoyed by the young people, who enthusiastically joined in time and time again – particularly enjoying getting wet and muddy!

The programme for each day comprised one or two outdoor activities (including archery, kayaking, initiative tests, gorge walking, rock climbing and raft building) held between teaching sessions in the morning and evening. The evening sessions involved a testimony based on a particular theme, a 'grill-a-leader' time, a multimedia presentation, a short talk and small group discussions. Later in the evening they undertook various activities such as a bonfire on the beach or a sand sculpture competition.

John says *'the young people responded positively to the teaching sessions. They all heard the Gospel explained clearly and thoroughly and were presented with the claims of Christ as they looked at various theme. These included the nature and existence of God, who we are, the problem of sin, God's great rescue plan in Jesus, how one becomes a Christian and discipleship-based issues'*. The teenagers were able to share and input via the small-group discussions during which leaders could talk more directly to the young people, discuss relevant issues, ask and respond to questions, and praying with them.

Looking back on the week, the leaders are so thankful to the Lord for so much: not only was the weather good, for the most part, but

they also enjoyed safety and protection throughout the week. The campers mixed and behaved well and leaders built a good rapport with the young people.

The number of campers was more than for several years – 35 in total – enough of a crowd, and creating a good, vibrant atmosphere. BCM are hoping for at least the same number again next year.

John is now planning a Camp Reunion which will be an

opportunity for the young people to meet up again and have a fun day as they reminisce over all their experiences of camp through slides, participate in fun activities, food and hear Bible talks. This will be a key time for the young people, especially those who took steps forward in their journey towards God.

John is responsible for following up each of the young persons who expressed their desire to respond in some way. One lad made a profession of faith and four, though not yet ready to 'become Christians', asked some serious questions, thereby expressing a desire to know more. Please pray for all these young people and John as he liaises with youth leaders and makes contact with the young people concerned.



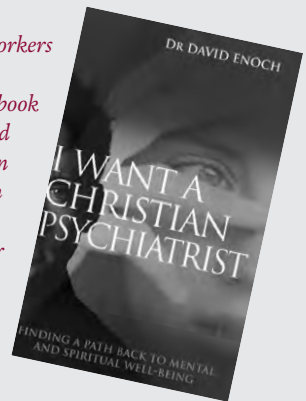

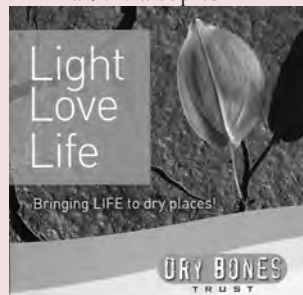

In 2008, Steve wrote an evangelistic booklet called '*Light, Love, Life*'. The cost of producing this booklet for UK use was met by a grant from **TES**, for which DBT is exceptionally grateful. The booklet has already made an impact in peoples' lives and has been used in a variety of situations and at a number of evangelistic events. One UK pastor said '*as a Pastor I have found the, Light, Love, Life booklet incredibly useful in Christian ministry. I have made them available after all sorts of events including outreach services, weddings and funerals. They have*

been much appreciated and I have found them to be a wonderful evangelistic resource'.
